

Community Drought Support Initiative Round 2 The Drought Community Support Initiativé (DCSI) is an Australian Government initiative that provides immediate financial assistance farmers, farm workers farm suppliers/ and contractors who live in eligible drought-affected Local Government Areas and to provide support to their local communities.

UP TO \$3000 FEDERAL GOVERNMENT DROUGHT SUPPORT

Not all impacts of the drought are the same. Whatever your situation, we understand that the lingering effects of the drought can be costly and recovery is on-going. Payments might cover numerous expenses such as groceries, vehicle maintenance, energy & utility bills, health & medical expenses, for example. To be eligible you must be:

18 years old or older

- An Australian citizen or permanent resident
- Living and/or working in an eligible Local Government Area Financially impacted by the drought

The benefit is limited to 1 per household up to a maximum cash payment of \$3000. Please note that assistance might be provided by either The Salvation Army or Vinnies, depending on your Local Government Area (LGA).

If you have any questions ahead of filling out an online application, you

can call Murilla Community Centre 07 4627 2027.
This an Australian Government initiative. Round 2 funding of the DCSI has been open since 19 November 2019 and will continue until December 2020. You can only receive payment once during this period.

Infrastructure awareness

Recently we reached out to landholders and community groups we work with to share guidelines around working safely adjacent to our infrastructure to protect you, our gas assets and our employees.

Working collaboratively enables us to highlight infrastructure using flags and other methods to ensure safe, effective workarounds for activities such as new fencing, cultivating paddocks near new right of ways, burning off of contour areas and blade ploughing.

Operational updates

CPB are active with pre-drill activities on properties north, east and west of Miles. This is ahead of Savanna Rig 449 which is scheduled to drill 10 wells around Miles during October and November as part of a larger development program stretching north from Condamine through to Condabri.

From October you may also see CPB working on the gathering network for these wells, including trenching and laying of pipe and cable. One of our completions rigs will then follow the drilling and gathering works to complete each well.

Miles Meals on Wheels

This year, 2020, Miles Meals on Wheels (MOW) celebrates 35 years of service to the community of Miles and district!

A public meeting was called on the 26th of February 1985 in the Miles Civic Centre at the instigation of Mrs Ann Johnston. A committee was formed with Mrs Bet Little (President), Mrs Ann Johnston (Vice-President), Mrs Joy Shapcott (Secretary) and Mr Hardy McMahon (Treasurer).

A door knock of the whole town revealed that 14 people would benefit from the service and arrangements were made for the Miles Hospital to cook meals for \$1.50; recipients to pay \$1.50. At the present time MOW have 12 recipients and the Miles Hospital still supplies a three course meal with a vitamin C supplement (juice), for \$7 and recipients pay \$7.

Letters were written to all the women's organisations in the town asking for volunteers to deliver meals, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. With a very good response, deliveries commenced on Monday the 17th of June 1985. Now 35 years later many of these same organisations and volunteers were still delivering until COVID-19 came to our shores and those in the vulnerable age group, which was about 90% of the volunteers, were advised to retire.

Fortunately others have come to the fore and with the assistance of Murilla Community Centre staff and Council staff, often foregoing their lunch breaks, a revised roster was able to be put in place and meal deliveries continued uninterrupted.

The service MOW is providing has basically remained unchanged over the 25 years. As a

The service MOW is providing has basically remained unchanged over the 35 years. As a celebration, on Wednesday the 26th of August (National Meals on Wheels Day) the Miles Health Service supplied a special meal and the recipients had the extra thrill of having it delivered by our local Councillors, Andrew Smith and Kylie Bourne.

The willingness and generosity of community members has kept MOW running smoothly for 35 years and now the Management Committee would like some new, younger and tech- savvy members. So we are once again appealing to our community for volunteers to come to the fore.

Shell's QGC Community Fund is open once again, offering community and traditional owner groups the opportunity to apply for funding between \$10,000 - \$40,000.

Last year 24 applications were supported and included projects such as irrigation upgrades, shade sails, solar panels and community hall enhancements.

Applications opened on the 28th September, closing on the 31 October. Successful applicants will receive their funding early 2021. For more details, visit the Shell website.





GANGARRI SOLAR FARM POWERS AHEAD

Shell's Gangarri solar project is taking shape, with construction work now well underway.

Gangarri is Shell's first industrial-scale solar electricity farm, being built near Wandoan in the Western Downs.

Civil works are well advanced and local Chinchilla business Specialty Services Queensland is currently installing the 30,000 piles required for project.

Over the coming months, the work program will also include the installation of:

• More than 900 kilometres of cable;

- 27 main inverter stations; and
- 45,000 electrical terminations.

The solar farm will generate 120 megawatts of solar electricity and is expected to be completed in early 2021.

National Council of Women's Scholarship sponsored by David Littleproud MP

On Tuesday the 25th of August, David Littleproud announced Georgia Wylie as the recipient of this year's \$1000.00 bursary. Georgia is in her first year of studying a Bachelor of Primary Education with the University of Southern Queensland and claims that after her graduation she wants to return

to the bush to teach students in rural and remote communities. This highlights her passion for rural and regional education as this bursary brings Georgia one step closer to her long-term goal of giving back to the hearing-impaired community. hearing-impaired herself, eventually Georgia would like to become an advisory teacher for hearing-impaired students.

Mr Littleproud declared that Georgia is without a

doubt an extremely worthy recipient.

To encourage rural women to pursue further study, Marañoa MP David Littleproud has offered

a \$1000 bursary through the National Council of Women of Queensland (NCWQ). "I know how important it is to ensure our next generation of young women thrive and are able to access financial support while studying. I am thrilled to be part of such a great initiative," Mr Littleproud said.

The Maranoa MP said many students were forced to move from their local community in order to

pursue further study after finishing school.
"Targeting education at students is a continual effort: identifying those with the motivation to study, tracking their progress and supporting their ambitions are all important factors," he said. "This bursary is designed for a female first year, full-time student in a tertiary course, such as university, TAFE or the Conservatorium of Music. I believe it is important to support and nurture a variety of study fields." To be eligible for the

bursary, applicants must also be a constituent of the Maranoa électorate, although they may have relocated for their studies. They must also be an Australian citizen or Permanent Resident of

Australia.

"We understand that moving out of your local community to pursue further study can be daunting and costly. That's why I think this is such a great initiative by the NCWQ," he said. "I hope to see many young people return to the bush and apply their skills in a range of different industries to grow our region." opportunity possible."

"Work is a big part of what makes up the great communities like Wandoan and surrounding towns and districts," he said. "The work categories will acknowledge the diverse work that goes on, from the gas industry to agriculture to truck drivers to shops."

Trevor said the photo challenge was unique in that it promoted Wandoan and the surrounding district and also supported the success of the Wandoan Show.

"We've been on board with the photo challenge the last couple of years and seen the competition grow over that time." he said.

Boost for Western Downs businesses thanks to grants

Almost \$70,000 in grants has been awarded to local businesses as part of the Shell's QGC Business

"We are implementing dedicated toolboxes to each work bay with the grant funding," said Mr Winter. "This allows for the disinfection of tools only once a day as only one staff member will be using that toolbox, rather than every time a tool is used, to prevent cross contamination." "This grant is a fantastic chance to get this done and into place now." "This will allow us to get on with the job of smash repairs while being COVID safe." "We take the COVID restrictions very seriously as it is important to us that we protect the safety of our staff, customers and our families." And the day ends...with a clean up, and admin.





BACK TO THE BUSHIESTIVA GENIDS & LARRIKINS

The theme for the 2021 Miles Back to the Bush festival is 'Australian Legends and Larrikins'. To enhance the Legends and Larrikins theme, we will be commemorating our very own Local Legends and Larrikins (Both living and Departed) through a series of short stories on the lives they have lived and how they have helped shape the Miles District.

LOCAL LEGENDS: John and Jan Mullins

A handsome young man... A pretty young lady... And so the story of a much loved Miles local couple began... On Australia Day in 1958 a handsome young man new to Miles pulled up in his work ute at the local Barber Shop to fill up with fuel.

The young lady who came out wearing a quaint summer dress, stilettos and freshly painted nails to fuel his car caught his eye. This lad is new to town and thinks this young lady is so beautiful he cannot take is eyes off her. As he leans against his ute looking cool, he dreams of the day that he might sweep this girl off her feet, marry her, and have half a dozen kids.

Sounds like something out of an old romantic movie doesn't it? Well it is so close to the truth it isn't funny. And that's how John and Jan Mullins came to be acquainted in the small township of Miles

Young Johnny Mullins came to Miles in the Summer of 1958. He was following a couple of his mates Tom Seaniger and Murray Purves, who had moved to Miles earlier to start their own business, and John had the same aspirations. The boys shared a house on the corner of Marian and Pine Streets.

John played footy for the Miles Devils, was Tom and Murray's 'water boy' when they played Tennis and did what all young fellas in small country towns do. Throughout his life John always enjoyed a cold beer and a smoke. It was normal to see him unwind after a hard day's graft puffing on a Craven A in one hand and holding a beloved VB stubby in the other. Jan was born in Miles as she says by 'accident'. Jan's parents Bowen and Jane Cable were returning

day's graft puffing on a Craven A in one hand and holding a beloved VB stubby in the other. Jan was born in Miles as she says by 'accident'. Jan's parents Bowen and Jane Cable were returning home to Yuleba on the passenger train when flood water over the railway line halted their progress for 3 days. During their forced stopover in Miles Bowen Cable was offered a job at the Local Barbers, which he later purchased coinciding with the birth of their baby girl Janice. The Cable's became Miles residents and remained in Miles for their entire lives.

John and Jan were a courting couple when in 1961 Jan entered and won the Inaugural Miles Miss Civic Centre. Miles Miss Civic Centre was one of the most Prestigious events on the Miles calendar for many years. John and Jan Married on 26th January 1963 and formed a partnership that was to see them build their business from scratch to the Hardware and Plumbing enterprise it is today. Murilla Hardware was opened in 1965 in Murilla Street, where it still stands today. A second Hardware store (Mullins Hardware) was opened in Chinchilla a few years later. The Miles shop sold everything hardware to many satisfied customers, while John had his plumbing side of the business in the yard beside the shop. As well as doing the usual plumbing jobs in the area, John and his workmen spent many hours building Galvanised rainwater tanks. These tanks were transported to homes, businesses, and farms all over South West Queensland.

Some of John's achievements during this time were being contracted to work on the new Charleville Hospital and being a part of building the Australian Stockmen's Hall of Fame in Longreach, where John and his men did the Roof and all Plumbing and Drainage. John Mullins Jnr took over Mullins Plumbing in 1993 and still operates in Miles today.

Whilst running their business' John and Jan also somehow found time to raise Six children – John, Melissa, Rachel, Fleur, Regina, and Marcus. All the Mullins children have at some time worked behind the counter at Murilla Har

should ever go through when their eldest daughter Melissa passed

away as a result of a car accident.

Show Society's not only in Miles but other towns in the region have benefitted from their generosity, as well as many sporting clubs. The Miles Devils, Miles Pony Club, Miles Golf and Bowls Club just to name a few. The Art Gallery in the Dogwood Crossing Centre in Miles and the Miles Races bears John's name as a memorial to a man and his family who have worked hard for the District and Contributed to the success of so much in our Region. 



1980 heralded new cars, new rules, turbo and rotary technology, plus a big thumping 500HP Z71 Camaro from the states with a Chanel 9 logo on its roof. However, the story of this particular decade will be kept for another October edition in future years. 2020 marks the last year that a Holden will race at the Bathurst event, lets hope that the ZB Commodore's last hurran at the

mountain is a success story.




JACKSON JOTTINGS

Creamy Tuscan Chicken Makes 4 Servings | 5 min prep | 40 min cook

Ingredients 1 fbsp. extra-virgin olive oil 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts Kosher salt Freshly ground black pepper 1 tsp. dried oregano 3 tbsp. butter cloves garlic, minced 1/2 c. cherry tomatoes, halved 3 c. baby spinách 1/2 c. heavy cream 1/4 c. freshly grated Parmesan Lemon wedges, for serving

Method

- In a skillet over medium heat, heat oil. Add chicken and season with salt, pepper, and oregano. Cook until golden and no longer pink, 8 minutes per side. Remove from skillet and set aside.
- In the same skillet over medium heat, melt butter. Stir in garlic and cook until fragrant, about 1 minute. Add cherry tomatoes and season with salt and pepper. Cook until tomatoes are beginning to burst then add spinach and cook until spinach is beginning to wilt.
- 3. Stir in heavy cream and parmesan and bring mixture to a simmer. Reduce heat to low and simmer until sauce is slightly reduced, about 3 minutes. Return chicken to skillet and cook until heated through, 5 to 7 minutes.
- Serve with lemon wedges.



Breakfast Baked Sweet Potatoes Makes 2 Servings | 5 min prep | 45 min cook

Ingredients 2 medium DOLE sweet potatoes, washed 2 tablespoons natural almond butter 1 DOLE banana, sliced 2 teaspoons chia seeds Cinnamon Sea salt

Method

- Preheat oven to 180C. Line a medium baking sheet.
- Use a fork to poke several holes in the sweet potatoes, then place on prepared baking sheet and roast sweet potatoes for 45 minutes or until tender. Remove from oven and allow to cool.
- Split the warm sweet potatoes open and sprinkle with sea salt. Drizzle 1 tablespoon of almond butter, 1 teaspoon of chia along with banana slices and a sprinkle of cinnamon in each sweet potato. Serve immediately.



Condensed Milk Swirl Slice Makes 10 Servings | 15 min prep | 25 min cook

Ingredients 395g tin condensed milk 2 tbs golden syrup 100g butter 1 pkt chocolate cake mix 125g dark chocolate

Method

- In a small saucepan, mix together condensed milk, golden syrup and 60g butter. Stir continuously over a gentle heat for 5-6 minutes until a thick caramel forms.

 Preheat oven to 180C. Grease a slice tin and line with baking paper.
- line with baking paper. Make the chocolate cake according to the packet instructions and pour into the prepared slice tin. Dollop spoonfuls of caramel on top of the cake batter. Use a knife to swirl caramel into the batter, do not overmix. Bake for 20 - 25 minutes until the cake is just cooked through. Allow to cool. Place the dark chocolate and remaining
- butter in a bowl and microwave in 30-second bursts, stirring in between until smooth. Pour over cooled slice and spread evenly. When the chocolate has set, slice and serve.
